California Statewide Study of People Experiencing Homelessness (CASPEH)

- Largest representative study of homelessness in CA and largest in the US since the 1990s
 - o 3,200 surveys
 - 365 in-depth interviews
 - Across 8 counties in California
- First to pair representative sampling with in-depth interviews
- Largest study on homelessness to collaborate with a Lived Expertise Advisory Board







About the CASPEH Lived Expertise Advisory Board



What is a Lived Expertise Advisory Board?

A Lived Expertise Advisory Board is a leadership body made up of external advisors who have lived or living experiences of the topic being studied or the issue being solved. Members of the board meet regularly and share input on critical processes. They are called upon to use their lived experiences in advising on aspects of the research project

"

The term expertise really puts in the fact that not only do we have life experience of that event or navigating whatever took place. 





Building a Circle of Trust







To be trauma-informed is to understand the way that traumatic experiences may have impacted the lives of community members and how policies and practices may bring that trauma to the surface. Trauma-informed facilitation applies this understanding to the design and facilitation of meeting spaces so that they are aligned with healing rather than retraumatization.




6 GUIDING PRINCIPLES TO A TRAUMA-INFORMED APPROACH

The CDC's Center for Preparedness and Response (CPR), in collaboration with SAMHSA's National Center for Trauma-Informed Care (NCTIC), developed and led a new training for CPR employees about the role of trauma-informed care during public health emergencies. The training aimed to increase responder awareness of the impact that trauma can have in the communities where they work.

Participants learned SAMHSA'S six principles that guide a trauma-informed approach, including:














Plan for Addressing Barriers
